

# THE IMPACT OF"FLUSHABLE" WIPES ON SEWERS

While many wipes are marketed as "flushable," they often create significant problems for sewer systems. Unlike toilet paper, which disintegrates quickly in water, most flushable wipes do not break down easily. This leads to blockages in pipes, damage to wastewater treatment equipment, and costly repairs for municipalities.

When wipes are flushed, they can combine with fats, oils, and other debris, forming large clogs known as "fatbergs." These masses can block entire sections of a sewer system, causing sewage backups and even spilling untreated wastewater into the environment. Addressing these issues requires extensive maintenance and increases the operational costs of wastewater treatment facilities.

Despite efforts to label wipes as "flushable," most wastewater experts recommend disposing of them in the trash. Sewer systems are designed to handle human waste and toilet paper, not wipes, sanitary products, or other non-biodegradable materials. By keeping wipes out of the toilet, homeowners can prevent plumbing issues, and communities can avoid costly sewer maintenance and environmental harm.

### **HOW TO KEEP YOUR SEWER LINES CLEAR**

There are a few simple things you can do to keep your sewer line clear and in good working order. Here's a quick overview of what they are!

Depending on the problem, a sewer line repair can cost a few thousand dollars. Because it can be such an expensive undertaking, it is important that you learn how to maintain a sewer line to help you avoid sewer line clogs.

**Be Cautious About Putting Food in Drains:** Food waste is heavier than other types of waste, meaning it does not flow through your sewer line as other things would. This also means that food can gather in the line and cause buildup. By scraping food off of your dishes and into the garbage can, you can avoid sewer line clogs.

Don't Flush Any Non-Food Items: Any item that does not properly break down will not flush through your entire plumbing system. They will catch on debris and may eventually create a blockage in your plumbing system. Even products that are labeled as flushable, like tampons and baby wipes can create blockages. Instead, it is best to throw these away.

**Use High-Volume Flush:** Using a high-volume toilet will flush any solid waste out of your sewer line, even in areas with a negative slope.

**Avoid FOG Buildup:** Because fats, oils, and grease are high-protein materials, they frequently cause buildup in drains. As the buildup increases, the pipe passageway gets smaller and smaller. To keep your sewer lines clear and free from blockage, it is important that you never let fats, oils, and grease go down your drain. If you cook greasy foods, it is best to wipe them out with a cloth or paper towel to get most of this grease off of your dishes.
